Ira Flatow joined WJCT President & CEO David McGowan for an enlightening on-stage conversation, where he shared insights into his career as a science correspondent and TV journalist and his work as founder and president of the Science Friday Initiative. The evening celebrated science storytelling and its ability to inspire curiosity and engagement across generations.



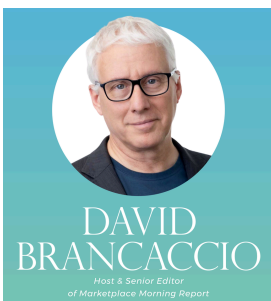
20 Days in Mariupol

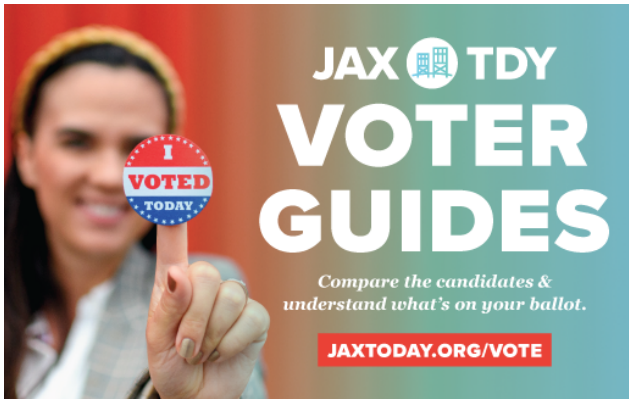
Noirvember: Double Indemnity

Election Coverage through Jax Today Voter Guides

In the lead-up to the 2024 elections, *Jacksonville Today* provided comprehensive voter guides for local and state races, ensuring residents had access to unbiased insights on candidates and ballot measures. These guides, published in the *Jacksonville Today* newsletter and on jaxtoday.org, covered key races from contests in Duval, Clay, Nassau, and St. Johns counties, as well as state legislature and congressional races.

New features included detailed guides and a candidate comparison tool for the November 5 general election. Also added in 2024 were candidate comparisons for candidates running for office in beach communities such as Jacksonville Beach, Neptune Beach, Atlantic Beach, and other Northeast Florida communities. Other resources included a Florida constitutional amendments guide, judicial retention evaluations for the Florida Supreme Court and appellate courts, and insights into local ballot measures, such as land conservation in Clay County and charter amendments in Jacksonville Beach and Atlantic Beach.

With over 100,000 views, these voter guides were essential tools for informed decision-making, empowering voters to participate in democracy with clarity and confidence. From the August 20 primaries to the November general election, *Jacksonville Today* ensured that citizens across Northeast Florida were well-prepared to make their voices heard at the polls.

How Voting Works with Duval Elections Supervisor Jerry Holland

On February 13, WJCT Public Media and *Jacksonville Today* welcomed Duval County Elections Supervisor Jerry Holland for How Voting Works, an informative and interactive event attended by community members. Hosted by *Jacksonville Today* Editor Jessica Palombo, the evening featured a live demonstration of the voting equipment used at local precincts and an in-depth discussion on election security and fairness. Holland answered audience questions, providing insights into the integrity of the voting process during a year with three local elections. This free event empowered attendees with the knowledge to navigate the democratic process with confidence.





Mister Roger’s Sweater Drive

WJCT Public Media partnered with VyStar Credit Union, Suddath, and the Tom Bush Family of Dealerships to collect cold-weather clothing and items—new or gently used sweaters, jackets, socks, and blankets—for members of the Jacksonville community. Over 9,000 lbs. of cold-weather necessities were collected throughout November as part of the 22nd annual Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood Sweater Drive. Representatives from WJCT Public Media, Suddath, VyStar Credit Union, and the Tom Bush Family of Dealerships distributed warm clothing and blankets to those in need at the Clara White Mission and City Rescue Mission on Monday, December 9.

With a variety of community partners, WJCT Public Media hosted 28 free lunch and learn events at WJCT Studios covering health and retirement topics, including:

Lunch & Learn community education events brought together doctors and leading medical experts who shared the most recent research and potential treatments for various health concerns. Other experts and skilled professionals with finance backgrounds educated citizens about retirement options and wealth management. Over 3,000 citizens gained invaluable information that is not always accessible at no cost to the general public.



2024 State of the River Report - Virtual Event

On October 14, *Jacksonville Today* and WJCT Public Media's ADAPT initiative hosted the virtual 2024 State of the River Report panel, drawing 94 participants to an insightful discussion on the health of the Lower St. Johns River Basin. This event marked the 17th annual release of the report, funded by the Jacksonville Environmental Protection Board and led by Jacksonville University's scientific team. The report analyzed key river health indicators, such as water quality, aquatic life, fisheries, contaminants, and endangered species trends.

The panel, moderated by Dr. Gerry Pinto, an associate research scientist at JU, featured an array of expert voices, including Dr. Chris Baynard (UNF), Dr. Brian Zoellner (UNF), Dr. Scott Jones (UNF), Dr. William Penwell (JU), and Dr. Gretchen Beilmyer-Fraser (JU). Together, they provided an in-depth review of findings and actionable insights for the public, covering topics such as salinity and nutrient levels, contaminants, and educational resources.

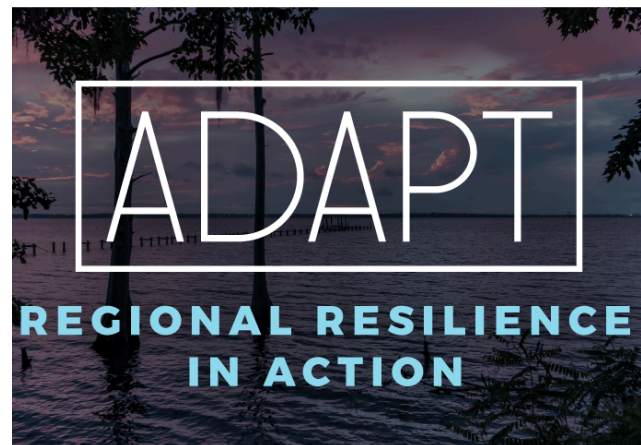

ADAPT: Regional Resilience in Action

On October 29, ADAPT, part of *Jacksonville Today*, in partnership with the Jacksonville Environmental Protection Board, hosted Regional Resilience in Action. The event drew 94 attendees to WJCT Studios for an engaging and informative discussion on preparing Northeast Florida for the impacts of climate change. The panel brought together local leaders at the forefront of regional resilience efforts, offering updates on ongoing initiatives and actionable ways for citizens to get involved.

The panel featured Jessica Beach, the City of St. Augustine's chief resilience officer; Anne Coglianese, the City of Jacksonville's chief resilience officer; Ashantae Green, the City of Jacksonville's sustainability manager; and Elizabeth Payne, the CEO of the Northeast Florida Regional Council. Moderated by *Jacksonville Today* Editor Jessica Palombo, the event provided a comprehensive look at the region's challenges and opportunities as it works toward a more sustainable and resilient future.

This free event highlighted the vital work being done at the local and regional levels to address the pressing realities of climate change and how collaborative efforts can drive meaningful progress.



Gospel in Jax

On March 5, WJCT Public Media hosted Gospel in Jax, a vibrant evening celebrating the profound impact of Gospel music in Jacksonville. The event brought together 102 attendees for a dynamic program featuring insightful discussions, live performances, and exclusive clips from Henry Louis Gates, Jr.'s new documentary *Gospel*.

Moderated by ethnomusicologist Dr. Fredara Mareva Hadley, a professor at The Juilliard School, the panel included Bishop Rudolph W. McKissick, Jr., lead pastor of The Bethel Church; Lisa McClendon, Gospel artist; and Freddie Rhodes, vice president of programming for Victory Radio. The evening also featured a soulful performance by Meachum L. Clarke & CO. This free event meaningfully explored Gospel's influence on Jacksonville's culture and community.



Jazz in Jax

On April 27, WJCT Public Media and the Jacksonville Music Experience (JME) hosted Jazz in Jax, a lively celebration of Jazz Appreciation Month. The event, attended by 253 guests, featured an engaging panel discussion that explored jazz's rich history and contemporary vibrancy in Jacksonville and beyond. Panelists included jazz advocates and local musicians such as Keanna Faircloth, Josh Floyd, Tracey Morris, Cara Murphy, Mr. Al Pete, Jeanetta Cebollero, and Yhang Quintero, who shared insights on jazz's cultural impact.

The evening also featured a special performance by Grammy Award-winning musician Ulysses Owens, Jr. & Friends. The event was timed with the premiere of *Jazz Beyond Tradition*, a six-episode limited series hosted by Owens and Faircloth, airing on WJCT News 89.9. This free event highlighted the dynamic and thriving jazz scene in Jacksonville.



Jazz Beyond Tradition

WJCT Public Media and the Jacksonville Music Experience debuted *Jazz Beyond Tradition*, a six-episode limited series celebrating Jazz Appreciation Month. Hosted by Grammy Award-winning musician Ulysses Owens, Jr. and award-winning radio personality Keanna Faircloth, the series explored the past, present, and future of jazz through captivating interviews and carefully curated playlists, connecting the genre's rich history to its contemporary evolution. The premiere episode aired on Sunday, April 21 on WJCT News 89.9, delved into the magic of jazz vocals, featuring rising stars Christie Dashiell and Ekep Nkwelle.

The show honored jazz elders and trailblazers while spotlighting the voices of tomorrow, offering a dynamic exploration of jazz's future. *Jazz Beyond Tradition* also featured interviews with celebrated artists like harpist Brandee Younger, saxophonist James Brandon Lewis, and journalist Marcus J. Moore, as well as insights into the vibrant jazz scene in Jacksonville. As Owens, Jr. described, the series was not just a show but a movement that aimed to preserve jazz tradition and offer a glimpse into its exciting future. The series aired every Sunday at 7 pm on WJCT News 89.9 and The Independent 89.9 HD4, bringing the joy and culture of jazz to listeners far and wide.

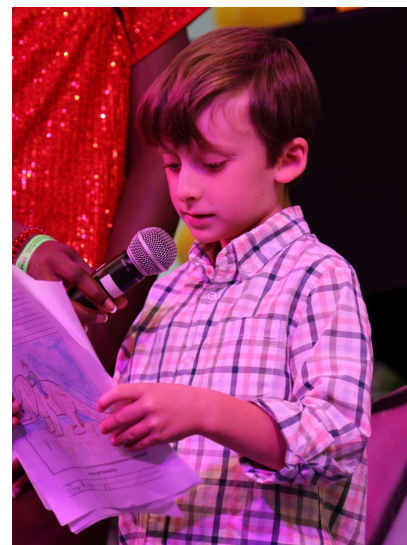

Read For The Record

On October 24, Read for the Record brought together a global community of readers to celebrate early literacy, featuring Jax PBS KIDS and host Andrew Williams. WJCT distributed copies of *Piper Chen Sings* to Jax PBS Kids Club members and each early learning center that hosts Family & Community Learning Workshops. This year’s event joined over two million readers, classrooms, libraries, and communities worldwide in reading *Piper Chen Sings*, a heartwarming story by Grammy Award-winning *Hamilton* star Phillipa Soo and Maris Pasquale Doran. This event, supported by Jumpstart and Jax PBS, encouraged children and families to explore the power of books, language, and emotional growth, fostering a sense of community and shared learning.

Family & Community Learning Workshops

In 2024, Jax PBS KIDS presented 77 Family & Community Learning Workshops at early learning centers across Duval County, engaging children and caregivers in multi-generational learning experiences. These workshops brought together families each month for fun, hands-on activities that promote early learning and school readiness. By incorporating play, creativity, and collaborative learning, these sessions were designed to prepare children for kindergarten and beyond while strengthening the parent-school relationship. The PBS KIDS Family & Community model, shown to improve learning outcomes, provided valuable opportunities for caregivers to bond with their children while enhancing their role in supporting educational success.

A typical Family & Community Workshop begins with an introduction to the day’s topic, followed by a rotation through various learning stations: the media center, reading center, activity center, and group sharing. The program also includes a family meal to encourage togetherness and discussion. Workshop topics are chosen based on input from participants and learning center staff. This year, subjects covered included STEM topics like shadows, ramps, and weather and social-emotional learning (SEL) topics such as loss/grief and self-confidence.

By the end of the year, the workshops had impacted over 160 children and 80 adults, with 1,600 books distributed and 1,600 meals served. The workshops are made possible through a partnership between WJCT Public Media, Kids Hope Alliance, the Gant Family Foundation, the Jim and Tabitha Furyk Foundation, Read Jax, and The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida. They help foster a collaborative learning environment that supports the entire child’s circle of care.



Be My Neighbor Day

Over 1,500 First Coast family members gathered at WJCT Studios on Saturday, May 11, for WJCT Public Media's 7th annual Be My Neighbor Day. In honor of *Mr. Roger's Neighborhood* and the new generation of *Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood*, WJCT Public Media brought together friends and community partners for a fun-filled Saturday festival, sharing with families how to be caring neighbors.

Activities Included:

- decorating placemats to share with residents at Almost Home DayBreak,
- meeting a community helper and learning how children and families can be helpers, too,
- making a bookmark for someone learning,
- finding a cool place in their neighborhood to explore,
- and pledging to do something nice for a neighbor.

Fifty neighbors participated, including new partners, Duval Teachers United, UF Lastinger Center for Learning at the University of Florida, Kid's Hope Alliance, Schultz Center, and hand2mind. Jax PBS Kids Writers Contest winners read their stories to a live audience and the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office and Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department were on hand to meet kids and share safety tips.





TEACH

WJCT Public Media presented the 9th annual TEACH conference on Saturday, November 23, 2024, at the Hyatt Regency Jacksonville Riverfront. This full-day professional development experience was tailored for voluntary pre-kindergarten (VPK) through 5th-grade educators. Presented in partnership with Kids Hope Alliance and PNC, this year's conference featured two inspiring keynote speakers, Susan B. Neuman and Vincent Taylor, M.Ed., who engaged attendees with their expertise and passion for education.

In the morning session, Susan B. Neuman, a renowned specialist in early literacy development and former U.S. assistant secretary for elementary and secondary education, delivered a compelling keynote titled "Educating the Other America." Sponsored by Kids Hope Alliance, Neuman discussed the disparities in children's academic achievement based on income, emphasizing the importance of providing additional print resources, prioritizing oral language and vocabulary development, and fostering strong relationships with parents. Her impactful presentation highlighted actionable strategies for educators to address these challenges and support early learning success.

The afternoon keynote, "If Instruction Isn't Engaging, I QUIT!" by Vincent Taylor, M.Ed., captivated attendees with its interactive and energetic approach to increasing student engagement in the classroom. Sponsored by PNC, Taylor shared research-based strategies that educators could immediately implement to foster greater engagement and improve academic outcomes. Known for his dynamic presentations filled with music, movement, and fun, Taylor left attendees inspired and equipped with practical tools to enhance their teaching practices.

The 2024 TEACH Conference brought together over 300 attendees from 90 schools and agencies, including 25 early learning centers on November 23 at the Hyatt Regency Jacksonville Riverfront. The event featured 18 breakout sessions covering a range of topics to enhance classroom instruction and student success, along with 50 exhibitors showcasing innovative resources. Educators had the opportunity to network, exchange ideas, and explore fresh teaching strategies. The conference reaffirmed WJCT Public Media's dedication to empowering educators and enriching the community through impactful educational initiatives.

The Jacksonville Music Experience (JME) on jaxmusic.org is a hub for discovering and celebrating local music. Featuring curated playlists, short-form music reviews, in-depth profiles of local musicians, concert recommendations, and a local music calendar, the platform provides users with an engaging and dynamic way to explore Jacksonville's music scene. JME also integrates NPR Live Sessions, offering local artists exposure to national and international audiences. The team collaborated with local and touring artists to record performances both on location at Blue Jay Listening Room, The Walrus, and Intuition Ale Works and in-studio on the WJCT Soundstage, including notable acts like Black Opry, Brandee Younger, and Sunny War.

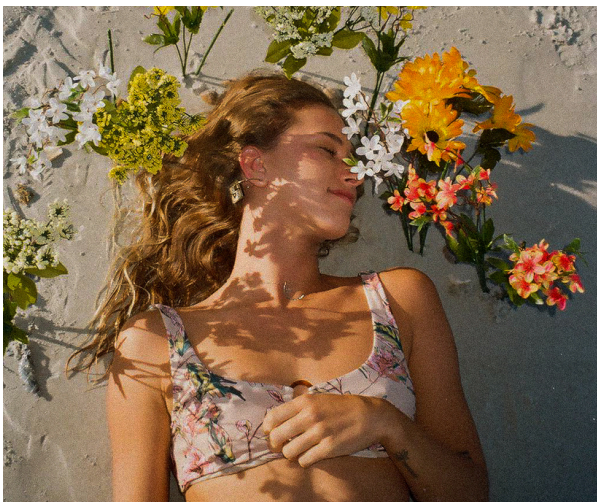
